


BURTON GREEN BELT

Land Area: 725 hectares

(0.05% of total green belt land and 0.005% of the total land area of England)



What kind of place is the Burton/Swadlicote Green Belt?

- This is the **smallest Green Belt** in terms of land area in England
- **Prevents the joining together** of Burton-upon-Trent and Swadlincote
- Very accessible, with highest density of the National Cycle Network and over 1,804 km of public rights of way.
- The vast majority of the land is in agricultural use; and half of this land benefits from Natural England support for environmentally sensitive farming.
- The landscape is in very good condition, with 67% of the area "enhancing" or "strengthening" its established character, and the remainder "maintained"

Green Belts:

Total area of all Green Belts in England is **1.6 million ha** (13% of England's total land area)

Nature conservation*

None of this Green Belt is registered as **Sites of Special Scientific Interest** of national importance for wildlife.

There are 3 different **priority habitats** that cover 36 ha (5% of this Green Belt)

2% (17 ha) of the Burton/Swadlicote Green Belt is **broadleaf and mixed woodland**[†]. Compared to 8% of all land in England

Agriculture†



13% is Grade 1, Grade 2 or the 'best and most versatile' **agricultural land**. Compared with 17% of land nationally.

96% (687 ha) is currently in agricultural use, compared with 71% of land nationally


54% of the total agricultural land[‡] is subject to Natural England funding **'agri-environment schemes'**. (67% of agricultural land nationally, and 53% of all Green Belt agricultural land, is subject to agri-environment schemes).

Landscape quality[†]



Landscape **strengths** lie in the condition of **agricultural land and woodlands**

The land is very good quality, with over half being identified as "enhanced".

"maintained" or "sustained" 33% "enhanced" or "strengthened" 67%

[‡]Note that the total for agricultural land on which the percentage covered by agri-environment schemes is based is higher than the total for agricultural land currently in use. This is because a small area of land classed as 'agricultural' is not currently in use.
